



REDUCING RETURNS TO PRISON

The number of individuals returning to prison decreased 22% over the last three years from 445 individuals in FY2017 to 347 in FY2020.

Decrease in number of clients returning to 9.5% prison from FY 2019





Reduction in laws violations for clients who had a review hearing



Of the parole clients on supervision completed their term successfully

Over the last four years,* DPS has obtained a completion rate of 65% of all clients on supervision. This rate is 11% higher than the 2018 US national average.





Every day, Nebraskans save over \$85 per person while that individual remains under **parole** supervision. Overall, the cost of supporting an individual on parole for one year is about 91% cheaper than the cost for one year of **imprisonment** in Nebraska.
