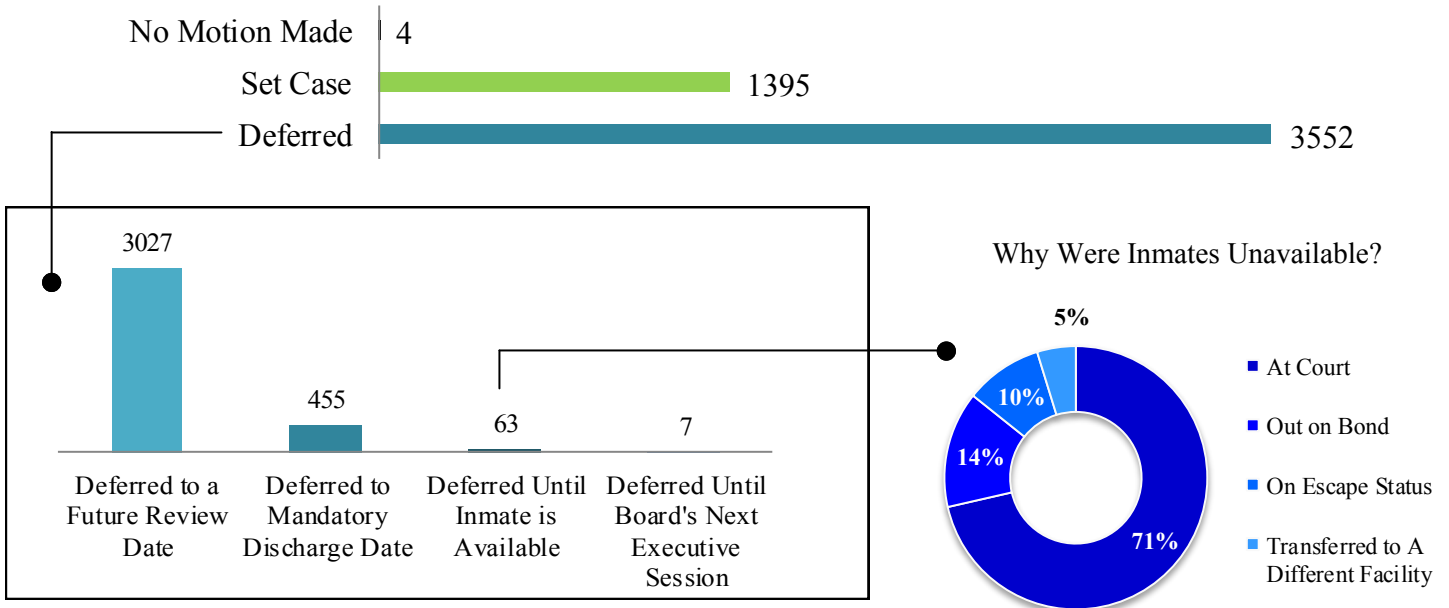


PAROLE REVIEWS IN FY 2017

A parole review is when the Board of Parole meets with an inmate to review the specifics of their case, their institutional behavior/misconducts, and the progress they have made with respect to their programming. At a parole review, the Board can decide to (a) set a parole hearing date for the inmate (a decision of set case); (b) defer the inmate to be seen at a later date or to the end of their sentence (a decision of deferred); or (c) no motion can be made by the Board. The graphs below provide the breakdown of these decisions and the reasons for those decisions.
